A PATH WELL CHOSEN

Ryan Thor’s testimony starts with a broken home. As a toddler he witnessed physical abuse within his parent’s marriage that eventually led to a divorce. At 6 years old Ryan was forced to choose between living with his mother or his father which caused a lot of confusion.

“Even though I went to church as a child, I did not have enough biblical knowledge or faith to ask the Lord for help, so I walked away from it all,” Ryan said.

Carrying the weight of a broken family, Ryan started to turn to material things to fill the void inside. He quickly learned that material possessions were not filling the God sized hole in his heart. In an attempt to fill the emptiness, Ryan turned to drugs, friends, women, and adrenaline sports.

Ryan was broken, but had not hit rock bottom. “I was damaged inwardly, I could hide my pain so that no one would know except me and God,” said Ryan. At 17 years old Ryan received \$55,000 from a lawsuit that allowed him to travel across the country multiple times. “I had my own car, my own money, and if I ever needed more money I would just pick up an odd job for extra cash,” said Ryan.

“My family found the New Life program and gave me an ultimatum. Start and Finish the program or we will be hard pressed to talk to you again,” said Ryan.

Reluctantly Ryan joined the New Life program at Muskegon Rescue Mission the day after his 30th birthday. Just two months of being in the program Ryan started to feel the presence of the Holy Spirit and decided to follow Christ.

“The best part is the finishing point does not look bleak anymore. I know that I am saved and do not have to fear death,” Ryan said with a smile.

After years of searching, and wandering Ryan is experiencing lasting change through Jesus Christ. Through the New Life Program Ryan has learned to be more patient, caring, and understanding of people. He is active at his church First Wesleyan, and has a full time job in Muskegon.

SIX LIVES TRANSFORMED

With 40,000 people living in The City of Muskegon, statistics show that 58% are unchurched which narrows down to 23,200 lives. Statistics also show that 35% of The City of Muskegon is living in poverty which comes down to 14,000 lives. Sadly Muskegon's poverty level is 147% higher than the national average.

However when there is darkness there is also opportunity for great light. Isaiah 9:2 says "The people who walk in darkness will see a great light; those who live in a dark land, the light will shine on them."

Muskegon Rescue Mission recently launched Project Connect. Through this initiative church's come to help build relationships with our community guests. This is done by engaging with the guests while they are at the Mission, through leading a chapel service, providing prayer support, and connecting guests with a local church.




Muskegon Rescue Mission is excited about the future for Project Connect and how we believe God will use it to help us see more of our City transformed with the wonderful message of the Gospel.


Muskegon - population 40,000

A LIFETIME OF CHANGE

Ken Wyman made a decision that has impacted his life and others, a choice that led to a moment of life change. Ken struggled for years with



alcoholism. After his wife threatened to leave him, he decided to go to treatment. While in treatment Ken realized he had a big problem, and treatment alone was not enough to create a lifetime of change.

Six months into the treatment, Ken had a relapse that almost took his life. This time his addiction took him to the hospital where doctors did their best to stabilize him. Ken's wife Linda was broken hearted and ready to walk away from the marriage. On her way out of the hospital, she decided to stop by the doctor's office, and he told her, "I don't know how I know this, but this man will never drink again."

After leaving the hospital Ken knew he had to change. He knew this change would be tough and that he needed to go back to the Lord. Ken and his wife chose to get involved at First Wesleyan Church. After being there a short time, he felt God tugging on his heart to do more.

"God wanted me at Muskegon Rescue Mission. God was telling me to go mentor the men at the shelter, and I did not want to," said Ken.


Ken knew he was being called to serve, and decided to contact Kevin Newton the Executive Director at that time. Kevin informed him about a new Men's Discipleship Program and the need for mentors. He knew this would be the perfect opportunity for God to use his story.

Ken continued, "It has been awesome watching the guys in the program change, and create a relationship with God." Two men Ken had the privilege of mentoring have graduated, and are thriving, and growing in their relationship with Christ.

It is not just the program guys whose lives have seen change, but Ken has been able to experience change in his life as well. Ken has now been sober for over 35 years! "By God's grace through Muskegon Rescue Mission, he has helped my wife Linda, and I with our marriage that was affected by my drinking in the past," said Ken.

For the past several years, Ken and his wife Linda volunteer at Muskegon Rescue Mission and share the life changing love of Jesus Christ with others who are broken hearted.

Muskegon Rescue Mission was able to celebrate another New Life Graduation. This summer we had two graduates, Tom Stone and Ryan Thor. (Ryan's story page 5) Both men spent the past year, working within the Mission, helping at Mission events, and growing in their relationship with the Lord.

Tom Stone came to Muskegon Rescue Mission a year ago after losing everything. He lost his house after he fell behind on payments, and his health started to decline so he was unable to work. In an effort to get his family back on solid ground Tom joined the New Life Program.

"A verse that helped me get through the program was Psalm 23:6 surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever," said Tom.

Through the New Life Program Tom was able to work on his character. He has learned to be more loving, patient, and understanding with the people around him. Tom is active at his church Shores Community Church and enjoys the interactive sermons.

After graduation Tom plans on staying in aftercare while he searches for his new house. Please continue to pray for Tom as he transitions into after care and finds a place of his own.
